

Be Prepared for a Cardiac Emergency

A Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is a serious condition that causes the heart to stop beating. In the United States, reportedly more than 356,000 people experience SCA each year. It can happen to anyone at any time. September is National Preparedness Month and Richland Public Health (RPH) encourages everyone to learn Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) - an emergency lifesaving procedure performed when the heart stops beating. When used correctly with CPR, an automated external defibrillator (AED) can greatly increase the chances of surviving a SCA.

RPH has partnered with Richland County Foundation to provide FREE life saving education and training, which includes an AED machine, to youth serving organizations through the Richland AED program. Program participants become part of a community network that better understands pediatric cardiovascular health and pediatric sports health. These extended partnerships improve community preparedness in the event of a cardiac emergency.

If you witness a sudden cardiac arrest follow these steps: 1- Call 911

2- Start chest compressions

3- Find an AED and follow the prompts

Preventing the Spread

Measles can cause serious health complications and it is highly contagious. Its symptoms include fever, red eyes, runny nose, a cough and rash of tiny red spots that start around the face and behind the ears, then moves to the rest of the body. Coughs and sneezes of an infected person spread the virus through the air for up to 2 hours after the person was there.

RPH was mentioned in the August 4th edition of the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, column Notes from the Field: Measles Outbreak - Central Ohio, 2022-2023 highlighting the Central Ohio outbreak that began on November 9, 2022.

The Communicable Diseases staff worked hard at RPH during the outbreak as others worked across the state to control the spread and to keep their communities safe and informed. They collaborated with health care providers, child care facilities, and community members. Their work included tracking the virus and educating exposed individuals throughout Central Ohio to prevent the spread.

When the outbreak was declared over, the following statistics were reported:

- · 85 confirmed cases were found in central Ohio; 78 in Franklin County, two in Madison County, and one each in Clark, Fairfield, Richland, Ross, and Union counties.
- 32 (38%) of the cases were exposed during emergency department visits to treat COVID-19, RSV and influenza.
- 23 of the confirmed cases did not have a rash until after they were told to quarantine.
- The ages of confirmed cases were 6 months old 15 years old.
- Sixty (60) patients were eligible for the routine measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccination, but only 3 had documentation of getting 1 dose.

Did you know that RPH not only schedules appointments for routine vaccinations at the health department, but we also provide walk-in Neighborhood Immunization Clinics on Wednesdays? These clinics in Richland County may be closer to you than the Health Department Clinic. Call our 24-Hour Immunization Hotline: 419-774-8115 to hear the Neighborhood Schedule.

Children must be accompanied by a parent/guardian or another adult with written parental consent, a current shot record, and insurance card, Medicaid Card, or Managed Care Card. Remember, no child will be denied vaccines due to inability to pay. Call 419-774-4700 to schedule an appointment. For more information including consent forms, recommended immunizations and

There was healthy engagement with everyone who cruised by/through RPH's large green and white tent. Community Health Screenings were administered by public health nurses. They provided free blood pressure readings and anemia checks as they educated individuals about wellness and prevention. Bug Bags were provided to help prevent mosquito and tick bites, which spread illness and disease. Deterra pouches were also distributed for community members to safely dispose unused medications and to help prevent accidental overdoses. The interactive inflatables models were by far a fan favorite. The larger than life sized body, breast and colon were on display for a fun educational experience. Visitors learned about typical body functions as well as how to recognize atypical functions and ways to prevent illnesses and diseases.
