### Richland Public Health Nurses assist families to navigate, network and advocate

Richland Public Health's (RPH) Children with Medical Handicaps Program (CMH), is administered by the Ohio Department of Health. Public Health Nurses (PHN) provide case management services to connect families of children with health care needs to a network of providers and payment for services. Penny Gardiner RN, BSN, works with the family of 18 year old Aaron, whose journey with RPH began when he was just an infant in the Newborn Home Visits program. His PHN during the visits provided health care resources, made referrals, and also assessed his growth and development.

Aaron has thyroid, vision, hearing and craniofacial structure abnormalities which qualify him for CMH. Donna, Aaron's mother, remembers the feeling of relief when they became part of CMH. It was a difficult time, when issues burdened her financially, mentally and physically. She states everything changed when she met Penny. Penny immediately helped her compile a "watch for" list of issues Aaron could encounter due to his overarching diagnosis



of Down Syndrome-which is not a CMH qualifying diagnosis. The list included everything Aaron deals with today. Aaron has an upcoming plastic surgery to align the bones in his face, followed by braces to correct his underbite. He's had procedures to correct his vision and hearing and his hearing aids will arrive very soon. Donna remarks, "I am so surprised the program picks up the tab on majority of Aaron's medical bills. There were about seven years I thought we no longer qualified because we made too much money for other programs. Then one day in 2011 Penny called and asked me why Aaron was no longer in CMH. I told her, 'we don't qualify' but she repeatedly insisted I apply

anyway, so I did. Penny's persistence is exactly what I needed." Donna says the guidance, support and encouragement from Penny is sometimes so vital to completing overwhelmingly daunting tasks. Penny's support extends to locating and sometimes calling and advocating to healthcare providers and service agencies for Aaron in ways Donna never knew possible. This is largely due to Penny's experience, knowledge of the field and her genuine desire to get the best outcomes for Aaron.

Donna encourages every parent in Richland County who has a child with a not so typical healthy journey to

call Richland Public Health and inquire about the

Children with Medical Handicaps program. No matter how much money you make or how many other programs you have been denied, she urges "apply for this program." She says her only regret was time spent out of the program when she thought they no longer qualified. Thanks to Penny's persistence and patience, Aaron has been able to get the medical services he needs for a fulfilling and productive life, without the financial defeat associated with, "making too much (money to qualify) for public assistance, but not enough to cover the needs. People who typically fall between the cracks." Penny explains, "So many people don't realize they actually qualify for the program. We use a cost share analysis tool which compares what the family earns to what they actually use for all household expenses including childcare, medical expenses and deductibles. People are shocked to learn there really is help for them"

The CMH program is not just for infants and small children. The program is for qualifying children from birth to 23 years old. Donna says during Penny's recent annual, she assisted her with completing guardianship documents. Aaron is legally an adult, but he is not competent to make sound decisions for himself. While this is a really big step in their lives, "I have never felt alone with anything, because I know I can always call Penny to help me with anything" says Donna with a warm smile.

RPH's Women Infant and Children (WIC) is the nation's premier health and nutrition program for pregnant women, women with a baby less than six months old, breastfeeding mothers, and families of infants and children up to 5 years old. Breastfeeding consultants provide support for everything from education, to providing nutritious food to nurture a successful breastfeeding journey for the mother and the baby.

Aug. 1-7 is World Breastfeeding Week (WBW). August 25-31 is Black Breastfeeding Week. Research suggests that breastfeeding is a key modifiable factor for disease in both mothers and infants. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and the World Health Organization (WHO) recommend exclusive breastfeeding for the first six months of life with the addition of appropriate solid food for the first year and beyond.
